
The Entrance to the Military Academy




Austin, steeped in historical and literary lore, is the political center of Texas. Its hills, lakes and rivers are ideal for picnics, hikes, and fishing trips.



Historical Sketch



The Very Reverend
EDWARD A. SORIN, C.S.C.
Founder of Saint Edwarad's
1878

Saint Edward's was founded in 1878 by the Very Reverend Edward A. Sorin, C.S.C., thirty-six years after he had instituted the University of Notre Dame near South Bend, Indiana. In 1871 Father Sorin came to Texas in the interests of the Congregation of Holy Cross and was struck by the singular beauty of the country around Austin. He determined to build a school south of the Capital City. In 1874 Mrs. Mary Doyle deeded Father Sorin three hundred and ninety-four acres overlooking the wide Colorado River Valley.

The Reverend John R. Louth, C.S.C., the first president, opened the school in the Doyle homestead in 1878. Boarding students were enrolled in 1881. A few years later Father Sorin decided that the school should be closer to the San Antonio highway. He purchased a long plateau extending westward from the school to the San Antonio road. He moved the criginal buildings and erected new ones on the present location of the institution. Father Sorin's foresight thus bequeathed the Military Academy with a beautiful campus, adequate drill fields, athletic

grounds, and extensive terrain for military maneuvers of almost five hundred acres.

The Reverend Peter J. Hurth, C.S.C., president from 1886 to 1895, did much to increase the enrollment. During his administration the Academy acquired a statewide reputation for giving its students a thorough education. Later Father Hurth was consecrated Archbishop.

In the Spring of 1903 the original Administration Building burned to the ground. Work began immediately on a new building which was completed in time for the opening of school in September. Holy Cross Hall was built the same year. Chemistry Hall and Sorin Hall were constructed in 1927. The infirmary was erected in 1933.

The military traditions of the Academy began in 1891 when three companies of the Hurth Rifles were organized. During the Spanish-American War Military Science and Tactics were taught. Several companies of Cadets were trained and drilled during World War I, but it was not until 1941 that the Military Academy was founded. In September of that year a voluntary Cadet Corps was organized. The next year Military training became compulsory for all high school students. The following year this compulsory Military training was extended to the College.

Although the Academy, because of the war's conscription of college-age men, is now devoted almost entirely to high school work, for eighteen years it has been a University. In 1921 the Reverend Matthew Schumacher, C.S.C., introduced college courses into the institution. From that year until 1925 he added a year of college work each Fall so that the school became a complete senior college which was granted a charter as a University. The first college class was graduated in 1925.

Father Schumacher's successor, the Reverend Joseph Burke, C.S.C., added more courses to the curriculum, first giving a wider variety to the already established program and then introducing classes in engineering, science, and journalism. The school continued as a senior college until 1943 when World War II forced the withdrawal of all students except those in the first year of college.

On October 13, 1943, the Military Academy of Saint Edward's University under the direction of the Reverend William M. Robinson, C.S.C., President, became a member of the Texas State Guard and the Third Training and Research Unit was established on the campus. In the Fall of 1944 the Academy became a 55-C school under the National Defense Act, and was received into the Eighth Service Command.

A Cadet Year Passes in Review

The Cadets assisted the State Highway Department in making a car census of Austin.






