

Powers, St. Edward's University trustee and Chairman of the Greater Austin Chamber of Commerce, Dr. Patricia Haves, President of St. Edward's University, Lee Cooke, Mayor of Austin, Sally Shipman, Mayor Pro Tem, and Chuck Taylor, Chair of the Chamber's Sports and Leisure Committee gathered in front of Old Main for a press conference to tell the world of the great news. Also present was the Travis High School band playing Deep in the Heart of Texas and about 50 photographers, camera operators and reporters.

get two NFL-caliber practice fields with national exposure from the Cowboys training camp move. About 1,000 visitors a day are expected on campus from mid-July through late August. The city will get use of some of St. Edward's recreational facilities, and an expected \$2.5 million boost to the economy.

Renovations of the fields is estimated to take about two months to complete. It is scheduled to finish on April 16 which is being done by Capital Excavation Co..

The original \$191,000 price tag for the renovation of the field was a low estimate according to a report in the Austin-American Statesman. The underestimation was due to the Cowboys specifications of a field that must drain within one hour of a heavy rain.



Victory at hand


The sport of volleyball has long been connected to sandy shores and bronzed muscle men attempting to impress their female audience. But at St. Edward's the picture is just a little bit different.

The team ended with a 25-19 and conference of 14-6.










Uniting together as one

The members of SAI bridge the gap between students, administration and faculty by listening, planning and acting. Some of their activities include a 200% increase







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
