






GOODNIGHT, MR. DEAN

opinions, beliefs and even complaints of the student body during the school year. The crusading editorials of these papers had an effect on the campus, and were actually heeded by both the students and the administration.



BROTHER CORNELIUS CORCORAN, C.S.C. Moderator of the Student Court

This year we saw the formation of the Student Court at St. Edward's University, For many years students have felt that they should have some sort of court which could make decisions on infractions of the rules. Then, under the leadership of Brother Cornelius Corcoran, C.S.C., and Oz-Haythorne the idea of the student court blossomed into the organization it now is.

The Court was placed under the jurisdiction of the Prefect of Discipline, and its functions were defined as "an organization which shall enforce the regulations of St. Edward's University, and which shall suggest punishment for infractions of these regulations." It enforced the school regulations by constant reminders to the student body of the regulations, and by quiet suggestions, rather than by force, it was able to create a respect for the rules concerning student attire and behavior at public functions.

The court was the subject of great controversy. Some were opposed to it, but the overwhelming majority was for it. Although there were vehement accusations against the court as in the "Bulls on Campus' article in the Tableau, for the most part the student body seemed to feel that the Court was an organization which was doing the school and themselves a great service.

Perhaps the greatest compliment to the court is the fact that every student who was punished by the court felt that the court had been just.




