



With a rustle of rich brocade and a swish of scented silk, Mme. Ngo Dinh Nhu swept into the U.S. the week of October 11th, 1963. She was accompanied by her handsome, Is year-old daughter, Le Thuy, and preceded by some of the worst press notices since Tokyo Rose. Small Colleges Will Remain Important

Father Benedict Ashley, OP regent of studies for the Chicago province of the order opened his talk, "The Future of the Liberal Arts in a Catholic College," by recalling his previous engagement at the University of Texas where the topic was concerned with society's need of God, at which time he mentioned that we could arrive at truth of this through operational logic.

Concerning the view that small colleges will go out of business. Father mentioned that he didn't think this would happen because the undergraduate needs contacts, needs to feel a part of something, all of which the student probably wouldn't or could-

n't get in a larger college. Since most educational money goes to the graduate school, we may see eventually the larger schools cater only to graduate students. The small school can thus work better with its undergraduate students and not make them secondary to research, as happens in a larger or graduate school. Specialization in school should not begin too early—there's no need of this since our system is not like that of the Soviet Union where a person is trained to do one and only one job. In our democratic system, a man is and should be trained so that he can take part in church, state, and other affairs; besides this, man should be considered as man and not as a pawn of the state. A liberally educated person in a democratic society will tend to see his place in society and will even tually specialize in something to better mankind and himself by his specific contribution, whereas the Communist can't see himself in society—he merely operates as one of many for the good of the state because of this lack of liberal thought inspiration. We see that the best of us goes into our vocation in life, that our salvation comes through our efforts, so by being educated liberally we can better our contributions to society.

THE LATIN WAY OF LIFE

The vanguard of the program was an illustrated lecture by Dr. Terence Grieder, Ph. D., of the University of Texas Art Department. Dr. Grieder spoke on Latin American individualism as reflected in the arts. He traced the emergence of the individual from early times to the present, and the accompanying effects as indicated by changes in art. Dr. Grieder included such points as the early pre-eminence of the group art, the nebulous separation between the arts and the crafts, the role of the Church in the ideals of art, and the European influence on South American Art. One of his more significant statements was that the group, in Latin America, exists solely for the support of the individual. Dr. Grieder concluded with the idea that artists generally prostitute their talents to the public taste, i.e., they paint what sells. The second lecture was given by Reverend Robert Menard, NM, who spoke on the Church in Latin America. Father made several interesting points, which would be of value to those wishing to increase their background knowledge of Pan-American culture. The most interesting of the three discussions during Latin American Week was a discourse on the political, religious and philosophical thought of Latin America by two students from Mexico, Jaime Garcia Granados Lasquetty, and Jose Maria Abascal.

PANEL COVERS "CRISIS IN PANAMA"

Crisis in Panama was the topic of the panel discussion sponsored by the International Latin American Club. Giving the historical situation leading up to the present crisis, Bro. Fabius explained that the U.S., by treaty in 1903, paid Panama 10 million dollars for the Canal Zone and a rent of a quarter million dollars per year. In 1936, the rent was raised to a half million dollars per year. From Panama's point of view, the situation was undesirable. "It created a state within a state" and split the country in half. There was the omnipresent economic inequity between the "Zonians" and Panamanians. Finally, during World War II and after, the surge of anti-colonialism struck Panama. In 1953 Panama had three grievances: (1) they wanted the rent raised from a half million, (2) they decried the unequal competition between the Zone and Panama and (3) they wanted equal pay for Panamanian and American workers doing the same job. By 1955, a settlement had been reached in all three grievances. The economic aspects underlying the crisis were presented by Armando Castillo, who proclaimd Panama an "economic colony of the U.S.," since Panama receives most of her imports from the U.S. and must sell most of her exports in the U.S. According to Mr. Castillo, Panama receives 21 million dollars for her exports and pays 125 million dollars for her imports, giving a balance of payments deficit of over 100 million dollars. Luis Luis, in presenting the political situation, noted that both the U.S. and Panama are facing National elections this year and therefore the heads of state must come to an agreement that will satisfy the public. That is, they must not make concessions that would injure the national pride in their respective countries. He suggested that one of the causes of the present situation is communist infiltration in the high schools and universities since 1952. President Chiari of Panama, he asserts, must get tought with the U.S. or the Communists will gain influence, and if they do the powerful national guard of Panama may depose Chiari. Any solution concerning the canal must be, he affirms, in accord with the strategic requirements of the U.S., the national aspirations of Panama, and U.S. ideals of peaceful settlements. It must also alleviate the economic disparity that exists between Panama and the Canal Zone, and it must be an agreement that would be satisfactory in an election year.




COMPUTER CENTER






THE ZOO STORY




THE BASEMENT
















