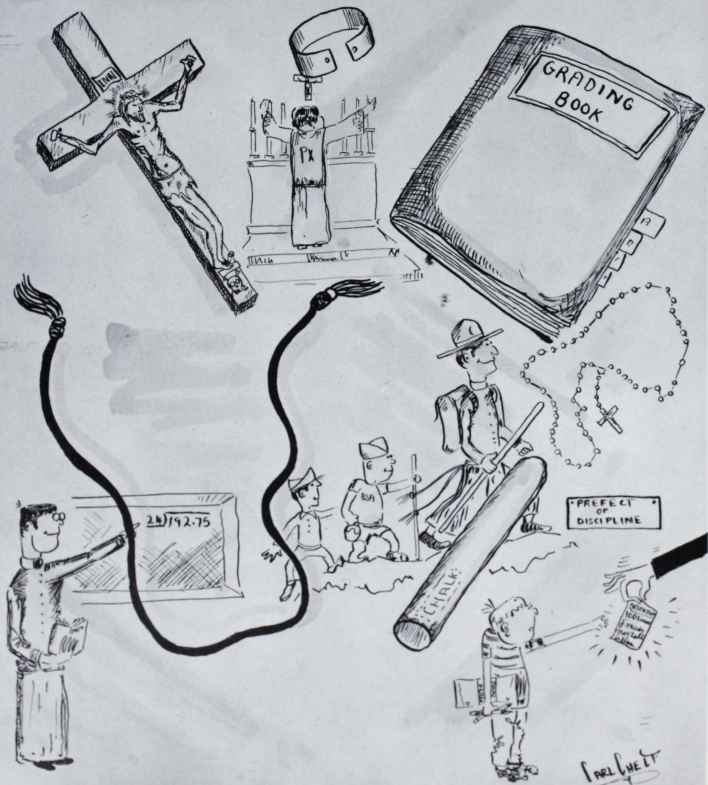
DEDICATION

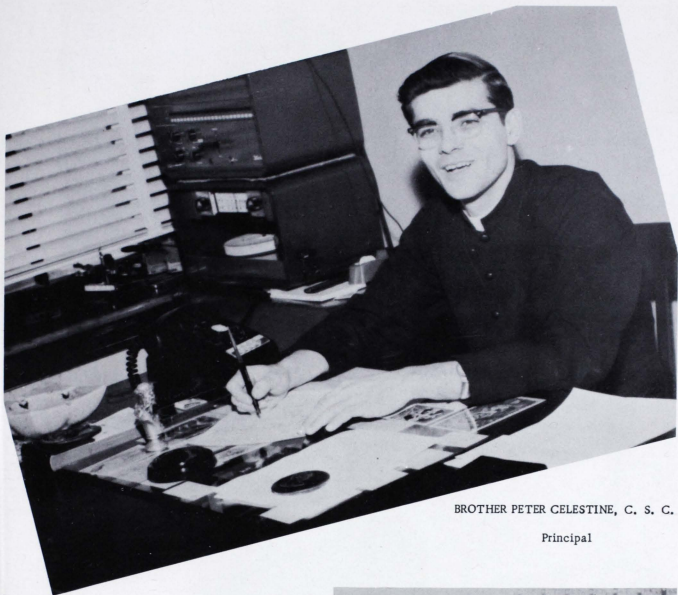

**DAN BARTOSH**

180 pound center, Dan lettered for his third time this year and was one of the Tigers' Tri-Captains. "Bobby" was elected by the S. A. L. to a position of All-District Center, one of three All-District positions named by the Tigers. His best jobs were blocking and tackling, but he also proved himself a good pass-blocker. Dan's best game was against St. Mary's during which he made 50% of the tackles and he led the Tigers set up a fighting line that accounted for the running T. D.

**BERNARD GILLETTE**

Camel Jockey, Sahleh, Turkish Terror, or whatever we called him, Bernie was a big help to the Tigers. Bernie was probably the hardest runner on the team, and one of the hardest tacklers. He liked contact and had all the desire to play that anyone needs. His best game was against St. Mary's when he gained 99 yards. Bernie had blinding speed for a fullback. He got all those yards running around the end of St. Mary's line. Bernie is a Senior and one-year letterman.

**DANNY GRAHAM**

Dan is a Senior Guard for the Tigers weighing about 180. He will be missed by next year's team. However, Danny's biggest contribution was his "stunned toe", he was the Tiger kick-off man. Seven times during the course of the season, he put the ball in the opponent's end zone.

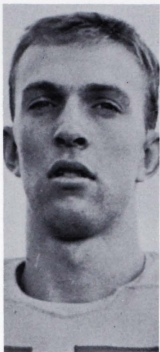
**THOMAS LUCKINGER**

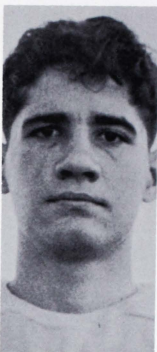
BRUCE MEYER

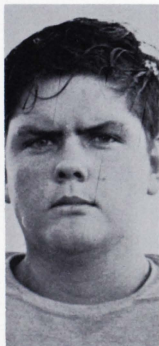
ED O'NEILL

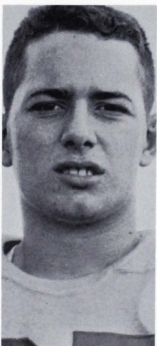
EDWIN SMITH

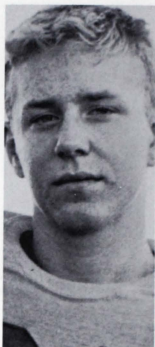
COSTELLO

Corky's big day was against Sacred Heart when he ran for a 60 yard reverse and a 50 yard pass play.



GUS CANALES

Gus is a three-year Junior letterman and Captain of the '38 Squad. As his nickname, "The Galloping Goucher" indicates, he was noted for his shifty running as well as his accurate passing. For his efforts this year, the coaches of the Southern Academic League elected Gus Quarterback of the All-District team, which is quite an honor for a player of Junior standing. His finest game was against St. Mary's when he rolled up 241 yards by himself—more than the whole Taylor team made on total yardage.

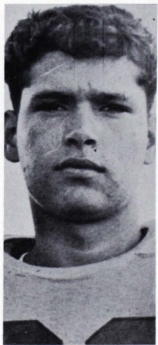
BILL HANSHAW

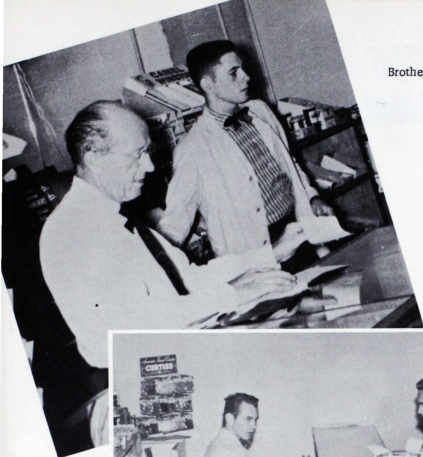
