
## Preface




How many times in thirty years had he responded to the request, "Father, give me your blessing"? We wonder and stand in awe at the









## Seniors




## Sophomores


### Cubs

Sincerity of scholarship and leadership is proven when the junior member of the society retains his standing and becomes a member of the National Honor Society for upper classmen.




